Each year, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists from across the state look forward to creating their entries for OUR MOB. In addition to an exhibition of new work from artists living and creating in South Australia, OUR MOB is an opportunity to come together and celebrate the diversity of arts practice from many different language groups.

Ku Arts is the South Australian support organisation for Aboriginal art centres and artists, with art centre membership in the APY Lands and Ceduna. We also deliver the Statewide Indigenous Community Arts Development (SICAD) program, supported by Arts South Australia, specifically working with artists outside of the APY Lands where there are typically no community owned art centres. The annual SICAD series of artistic workshops and professional development programs offers artists the opportunity to explore new methods and mediums to invigorate their creative practice. It is always exciting to see work produced in these workshops feature in the OUR MOB exhibition and in 2018 we see work from our recent programs in Oodnadatta and Coober Pedy, in the Far North of SA.

The directors of Ku Arts have a strong message of support for our young people - you are our future leaders. Ku Arts is proud to continue sponsorship of the Our Young Mob award, a category of the exhibition that continues to present the vitality of arts practice from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists aged 18 and under. We hope this award encourages future generations to continue creating and sharing their stories.

DON DUNSTAN FOUNDATION AWARD WINNER: PATRICK IKARINGANYI FERGUSON

Patrick 'Ikaringanyi' Ferguson was born in Broken Hill, New South Wales in 1976, growing up in the remote town of Tibooburra (population 150).

Patrick's childhood was filled with traditional knowledge and customs passed on by his grandmother and mother. This upbringing instilled cultural connection to land, spirit and respect for the resources that were abundant for hunting and gathering.

Patrick's grandfather was a Western Aranda man from Hermannsburg mission with connection to the Pitjantjatjarra lands and his grandmother, an Adnymathanha woman, was from the Flinders Ranges in South Australia and north of Coopers Creek, Yawarrawarraka.

In 2004 Patrick was honoured to participate in ceremony (transitioning through initiation to become a Wati man) with his family and tribal groups of the Anangu Pitjantjatjarra Yankunytjatjara Lands.

Patrick spent considerable months going through the initiation and although it is forbidden to speak of the formalities of ceremony, one thing that that came from this time was his belonging and urge to create Aboriginal artifacts through Punu.

Punu (woodcarving) is the longest surviving resource known to man and has been a valuable product for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians since the dreamtime

"These Punu come from my lands and are only utlised as needed. I carve artifacts such as clap sticks, shields, boomerangs, spears and Piti bowls."

Predominately carving Punu artifacts from Mulga and Red Gum, Patrick creates his artifacts in Adelaide, South Australia and travels the country to exhibit his work. This includes exhibiting annually in OUR MOB and a recent solo exhibition, which was the first in 25 years at Tandanya National Aboriginal Institute Gallery, Adelaide.


Patrick also travels to ensure children of all communities are taught this unique craft, sharing and teaching children to make Punu artifacts.

Before creating the Punu the children are taught the importance of only using what you need and where the Punu are located in different traditional lands.

"I am proud of my culture and my connection to Punu, this is my love and spiritual obligation to my people."

The Don Dunstan Foundation is very proud to support Aboriginal artists like Patrick. We recognise our many talented South Australian Aboriginal artists and the power of their stories which is why we choose to be involved in the annual OUR MOB exhibition. This Emerging Artist prize provides a launch-pad for up-and-coming Aboriginal artists to develop an arts career and for their artworks and stories to gain exposure to a national audience.




