We know that the Festival Program is exhaustive, and it can be hard to decide the best show, workshop, or activity for the students in your class. The team at DreamBIG are happy to chat you through performance options, including reasonable adjustments that we can make to accommodate the needs of your class.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

There are a few ways to use this document:

- You can look at the recommended shows for Auslan interpretation, audio description, relaxed performances, or calm activities see our recommendations on <u>page 5</u>.
- Before booking, you can look up any show or event in the DreamBIG program alphabetically to find out more information about what to expect at that event, and if that event is right for your class.
- Before attending DreamBIG, you can look up any show or event for information about how to access particular venues, to find visual stories, and other key information that will make your time at DreamBIG as smooth as possible.

ACCESS ICONS

The following symbols in the guide indicate the accessibility of each event.

Just Watch - this activity asks for the audience to sit, back, relax, and enjoy the show unfolding in front of them (with little or no audience participation).



Get Involved - this activity is hands on. Participants are encouraged to get in on the action through dancing, making, or sharing their thoughts and ideas.



Noisy - This activity involves loud noises or music. It may be overstimulating for people with who are particularly sensitive to loud noises.



Outside - This activity takes place outside, and participants are encouraged to dress for the weather.

STAIR-FREE ACCESS AND PREFERRED SEATING

All DreamBIG venues are wheelchair accessible; however, we'd love for you to inform us of any physical access requirements when you book so that we can ensure that we are ready to welcome you, and send you specialised access instructions if applicable.

All DreamBIG shows are general admission. This means that there is no allocated seating. If you have students that would prefer to sit at the back of the auditorium or in an aisle, please let our front of house staff know on arrival to the performance, and they will help you to find the best seat for your students.

EAR PLUGS

DreamBIG has ear plugs available for patrons who require them. Please ask our friendly front of house staff members for a pair if you or a person in your care needs them.

VISUAL STORIES

Visual stories (also sometimes called social stories) are learning tools for children who may need help learning ways of behaving in unfamiliar social settings. Visual stories do this by clearly showing the reader details about a location or event, what happens at that event, and what actions and behaviours are expected from them at the event.

DreamBIG has created visual stories for most of our performances and installations for teachers and parents to share with children who might need help preparing for participating in the festival. They can be found on each individual show page as well as DreamBIG's access webpage and are free to download.

If you would like us to collate a visual story specific to your experience at DreamBIG, we are more than happy to do so.

SUGGESTED PRE-SHOW IMMERSIVE ACTIVITY IDEAS

Below is a list of activities to prompt thinking on the types of pre-teaching that may be beneficial in conjunction with the visual story activities:

- Environment orientation this could involve setting up a 'mock' theatre set-up (Different lighting, seating configurations etc)
- Costume orientation experimenting with costumes to build understanding of the concept
- Sensory orientation utilising the visual story for deeper sensory requirements and strategy development
- Theatre orientation bingo (inclusive of visuals and sounds)
- Real/Not Real activities that explore the notion of acting, or portraying a story with real people
- My theatre excursion check list students to develop a checklist for different theatre situations/actions after engaging with a visual story

RELAXED PERFORMANCES

A relaxed performance is a show where the 'rules' of the theatre, and those asked of audience members, are relaxed. This could include:

- Increased lighting in the auditorium
- Ability for the audience to come and go more frequently if they need quiet time during the show
- The technical team on the show changing some of the sound and lighting in the show so that they are quieter or less flashy

DreamBIG does not allocate specific shows as 'relaxed'. We are happy to make any show relaxed. Please let us know if you would like your class's performance to be 'relaxed' by emailing <u>dreambig.ticketing@adelaidefestivalcentre.com.au</u>

A Simple Space

Gravity & Other Myths

Seven acrobats push their physical limits to the extreme. A breathtaking and joyful display of fearless acrobatics and death-defying feats, A Simple Space will blow you away with their exceptional skill, playful competitiveness, trust and friendship. Backed by the driving rhythm of a live percussionist, the stakes get higher with every daring stunt as the performers hurl one another through the air and build teetering human towers.

Venue: Dunstan Playhouse, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Automatic doors located on the Riverdeck, near Adelaide Railway Station Venue Type: Enclosed Theatre with high ceilings and air-conditioning Seating: dense, non-allocated seating with back support. Toilets: Located in the theatre foyer

Event Type: Performance – Circus Dates: 13 & 14 May 2025 Duration: 45 minutes Ages: 6 - 18 / Years 1 - 12 Nonverbal



A Simple Space takes place in a traditional theatre space, with low lighting levels in the auditorium. There are several rows of seating on the stage itself. Our front of house staff (in discussion with you, on the day of the performance) will determine if your group is appropriate to be seated on the stage.

There are some loud, unexpected noises, and the performance is performed to live music.

The audience will be asked to participate in a call and response, and the performers will interact directly with the audience. Select audience members may be invited to participate in the performance on stage.

The show is non-verbal (beyond the performers verbally cueing each other). One segment of the performance specifically uses body percussion.

Book Boogie

The words and pictures from the books at the Library have gone on holiday! The DreamBIG clown librarians need your help to write and illustrate the books. The librarians will try to give you a hand - but they might also be a bit silly.

Venue: Circulating Library, State Library of South Australia

Doors & Entry: Large doors are located on North Terrace, there are two steps, or an automatic door up a ramp on the left side of the building.

Venue Type: The Circulating Library is a classroom sized space. The walls are covered in books. These books are old and it would be best that they were not touched.

Seating: Participants will be seated at chairs and tables.

Toilets: Main toilets are down a set of stairs, and an accessible toilet is at the back of the foyer of the Institute Building in the State Library.

Event Type: Interactive Installation Dates: 7 – 9 May 2025 Duration: 40 minutes Ages: 4 - 8 / Years Pre - 2



Book Boogie is an interactive installation with a workshop component. One class participates per session. The clown librarians act as facilitators, and issue instructions.

Participants can explore the space at their own pace and can exit the workshop and re-enter whenever they are ready to re-join.

Participants may interact with the clown librarians in a one-on-one capacity, or in a group setting. Auslan interpreters can be provided upon request.

By Trial and Error

Content Pour Peu

The stage is set: a simple black curtain stands centre stage. Then two hidden circus artists appear and the show begins... But as the two disoriented acrobats move to perform their first lift, a terrible doubt arises in their seemingly well-oiled routine. Is this the right move? Is this what they rehearsed?

Driven by the need to continue at any cost, the duo invents new moves and jostles. Full of humour borrowed from silent cinema and impressive circus skills, By Trial and Error is a delightful exploration of the power of perseverance.

Doors & Entry: Automatic doors located on the Riverdeck, near Adelaide Railway Station Venue Type: Enclosed Theatre with high ceilings & air-conditioning Seating: dense, non-allocated seating with back support. Toilets: Located in the theatre foyer

Key Details:

Event Type: Performance – Circus Dates: 7 – 9 May 2025 Duration: 45 minutes Ages: 6 - 15 / Years 1 - 9 Minimal dialogue



By Trial and Error takes place in a traditional theatre setting, with low levels of lighting in the auditorium. Audience members should expect the following:

- Some music & loud noises
- Minimal dialogue
- If audience members leave the auditorium, they may need to wait until an appropriate moment in the show to return to their seat.
- A relaxed attitude is taken to noise and movement.

Select audience will be asked to participate in a call and response, and the performers will interact directly with the audience. Select audience members may be invited to participate in the performance on stage.

Creating Comic Book Characters

George Rex

Learn the basics of character design with comic book artist George Rex (Georgina Chadderton). Learn about the different techniques they use to express a character's personality or emotions and how they tackle working through their perfectionism to make fun, unique cartoon characters.

Venue: Circulating Library, State Library of South Australia

Doors & Entry: Large doors are located on North Terrace, there are two steps, or an automatic door up a ramp on the left side of the building.

Venue Type: The Circulating Library is a classroom sized space. The walls are covered in books. These books are old and it would be best that they were not touched.

Seating: Participants will be seated at chairs and tables.

Toilets: Main toilets are down a set of stairs, and an accessible toilet is at the back of the foyer of the Institute Building in the State Library.

Key Details:

Event Type: Workshop Dates: 13 - 16 May 2025 Duration: 60 minutes Ages: 8 - 15 / Years 3 - 9



This workshop is a drawing workshop. Participants:

- will be expected to work on their own drawings during the session (no collaboration).
- will be asked to participate in contributing ideas in a group setting.
- will be asked to draw under a limited time constraint, which some participants can find challenging. The facilitator is happy to discuss alternatives with individual students who struggle with this.
- can exit the workshop, and re-enter when they are ready to join.

Venue: Banquet Room, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Enter either via the Festival Theatre's Elder Park entrance, or via King William Road doors near Reconciliation Plaza.

Venue Type: Dark room with special effect lighting.

Seating: Participants will remain standing and can move around the room.

Toilets: Located in the theatre foyer

DreamBIG's 50th Birthday Party is an interactive workshop where participants are shown and given the opportunity to use visual arts and craft techniques, followed by a 10 - 15 minute 'disco'.

Fancy Long Legs takes place in a traditional theatre space. However, each performance will be considered 'relaxed':

- The house lights will be left on to create ambient lighting
- Audience members can leave the auditorium at any time and re-enter when they are ready
- A relaxed attitude will be taken to noise and movement from the audience
- Auslan interpretation, audio description and touch tours can be arranged upon request at the time of booking.

50 Years of Dreaming Big

Celebrating 50 years of South Australia's Children's Festival

In 1974 the Youth Program Committee of the Adelaide Festival of the Arts hosted a program for young people that they called 'Come Out'. This program was so successful that it was reborn the following year as a stand-alone festival - the Come Out Children's Festival.

This special exhibition explores the 50 year history of South Australia's beloved children's festival. Register your class to listen to the exhibition's audio guide and contribute their ideas to future festivals!

Venue: Festival Theatre Foyer, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Enter either via the Festival Theatre's Elder Park entrance, or via King William Road doors near Reconciliation Plaza. Exhibition located on ground floor ('stalls') of the Festival Theatre Foyer.

Venue Type: Gallery space with minimal windows.

Seating: not applicable – wander around the space at your own pace.

Toilets: Located in the theatre foyer

Event Type: Exhibition Dates: 7 – 16 May 2025 Duration: 25 minutes Ages: All Contains dialogue



This exhibition can be explored with an audio guide headset, or without. Participants can explore the space at their own pace and exist and re-enter when they are ready to join. Participants are invited to contribute an artistic response to the exhibition.

Glow & Tell

Patch Theatre

Blending the magic of light and simplicity of storytelling, children are placed at the centre of this engaging interactive experience. Inside a custom-built tent, stories and imagined worlds come alive as glowing drawings appear on the walls and floor. Following the performance, children are invited to create and illustrate their own stories in glowing UV light.

Venue: Rehearsal Room, Dunstan Playhouse, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Automatic doors located on the Riverdeck, near Adelaide Railway Station. Front of house staff will gather participants in the Dunstan Playhouse foyer before leading them down a flight of stairs to the rehearsal room (lifts available if required).

Venue Type: Custom-made tent that holds up to one class at a time, with low levels of lighting. Seating: Participants are seated on the floor

Toilets: Please ask front of house staff to direct you to the closest toilets when in the rehearsal room.

Event Type: Interactive Performance Dates: 7 – 9 May 2025 Duration: 30 minutes Ages: 4 - 8 / Years Pre - 2 Contains dialogue



Glow & Tell takes place in a custom-built tent large enough to accommodate 30 children at a time, seated on the floor. One performer tells a story, drawing pictures on the dark walls with UV light, before inviting the audience to create their own images.

Students will be required to listen to instructions from the performer, although a relaxed attitude is taken to noise and movement.

The space is wheelchair accessible, but the performers will need to be informed of any attending wheelchairs in advance to adapt the space.

IMAGINE LIVE is a celebration of creativity, friendship and the wonders of our natural world. With the help of the audience, performers play and sing their way through the pages of Alison Lester's iconic bestselling book and quickly discover there is WAY more to these pages than first meets the eye.

Spot a leopard, dive with a dolphin or dig up a dinosaur as this iconic book springs into life before your eyes. Created by the multi award-winning team from Robot Song, IMAGINE LIVE is a 60 min interactive magical musical performance.

Venue: Dunstan Playhouse, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Automatic doors located on the Riverdeck, near Adelaide Railway Station Venue Type: Enclosed Theatre with high ceilings and air conditioning Seating: dense, non-allocated seating with back support. Toilets: Located in the theatre foyer

Key Details:

Event Type: Performance – Theatre Dates: 7 – 9 May 2025 Duration: 60 minutes Ages: 5 – 11 / Years R - 5 Contains dialogue



Imagine Live takes place in a traditional theatre setting, with low lighting in the audience. It is a musical, with a music backing track. Please note:

- The show involves performers venturing out and interacting with the audience
- A relaxed attitude is taken to noise and movement
- Audience members can exit and re-enter the auditorium during the performance if required.

Auslan interpretation, audio description and touch tours can be arranged upon request at the time of booking.

I Will Be: A Future Leader

Parliament of South Australia

Get inspired to be a future leader! Explore what it means to be a representative, and how representation works in our democracy. Students will get to put their new skills to the test in this hands-on workshop, which includes a tour of Parliament House.

Venue: Parliament House

Doors & Entry: Enter via the large main stairs of Parliament House. For a stair-free entry, enter via the glass 'Old Parliament House' entrance – in the direction of the train station. Once your class has proceeded through the security screening, your facilitator will meet you on the other side. The Security Screening is similar to that at an airport.

Space: Enclosed with high ceilings and lots of windows.

Seating: Students will be seated around tables and chairs.

Toilets: Multiple throughout the site. Staff will indicate the closest ones at the start of the session.

Listen to Me – The Things That Matter to SA Kids

DreamBIG Children's Festival and The SA Commissioner for Children and Young People

Curious to see some of the 65,000 postcards received by South Australia's Commissioner for Children and Young People via her annual *Student Voice Postcards* initiative?

This remarkable exhibition reveals what children aged 8 - 12 years have told the Commissioner matters to them most! Starting in 2019, 'Postcards' provides an opportunity for children in this age group to experience what it's like to have a voice and be heard. Children 'Tell Helen' their ideas and share their worries, hopes and dreams, and the Commissioner uses these insights to advocate on their behalf, ensure policy makers and state leaders consider children's views.

This special exhibition celebrates this empowering project and enables children (and grownups) to explore the postcard responses in this highly interactive, fun-filled installation.

Venue: Children's Artspace, Dunstan Playhouse, Adelaide Festival Centre

Entry: The main entrance to this exhibition is via Festival Plaza. Use the escalators, the lift, or the switchback ramp to travel from the Dunstan Playhouse to Festival Plaza and follow signage to the Children's Artspace.

Space: Light-filled gallery with lots of windows.

Seating: Not applicable. Students can sit, walk, stand and explore the exhibition at their own pace. Toilets: There are toilets located in the Dustan Playhouse Foyer.

Key Details:

Event Type: Interactive Exhibition Dates: 7 - 9 & 13 - 16 May 2023 Duration: 20 minutes Ages: 8+ / Years 2+



This exhibition is an interactive installation. Participants can:

- Explore the space at their own pace.
- Exit the exhibition and re-enter when they are ready to re-join.
- Touch anything in the space.
- Contribute to the installation by following written and/or verbal instructions.

Literacy Tales

Adelaide Zoo

Nurture your little one's curiosity with Literacy Tales at Adelaide Zoo, designed for adventurers from Foundation to Year 2. Children will explore the zoo through stories and craft and learn about a specific animal. Enjoy our large open-plan space for crafts, a cozy nook for storytelling, music, and movement, plus an exciting adventure to meet animals up close. This exciting program immerses students in imaginative stories, informative animal information, and fun activities. Perfect for fostering a sense of connection and adventure among your tiny herd of explorers.

Venue: Adelaide Zoo

On Arrival:

• Use the front entrance off Plane Tree Drive.

• Enter the zoo and wait for your facilitator opposite the Gift Shop.

Space: Inside the Education Centre (classroom style room) and walking around the zoo Toilets: There are toilets in the Education Centre. There are accessible toilets near the Nature Playground, the Main Entrance, the Rotunda and the Envirodrome.

Event Type: Workshop Dates: 7 - 9 & 13 - 16 May 2023 Duration: 45 mins Ages: 4 – 8 / Years Pre – 2



This workshop involves both activities inside a classroom, as well as walking to specific locations outdoors in the zoo. Participants will be asked to listen to facilitators, as well as take part in activities.

Little Bozu and Kon Kon

Omusubi Productions in association with Sydney Opera House

An unlikely duo unite in a story of self-acceptance and empathy.

Fusing Japanese folklore traditions and contemporary storytelling, Little Bozu and Kon Kon follows a shapeshifting raccoon and a misunderstood fox from different worlds. After a series of mistaken identities, Little Bozu and Kon Kon recognise and celebrate each other's uniqueness.

Venue: Institute Gallery, State Library of South Australia

Doors & Entry: Large doors are located on North Terrace, there are two steps, or an automatic door up a ramp on the left side of the building.

Venue Type: Enclosed theatre with high ceilings & air-conditioning

Seating: dense, non-allocated seating with back support. The front two rows of audience members will be seated on floor mats.

Toilets: Main toilets are down a set of stairs, and an accessible toilet is at the back of the foyer of the Institute Building in the State Library.

Key Details:

Event Type: Performance Dates: 7 - 9 May 2025 Duration: 35 minutes Ages: 4 - 9 / Years: Pre - 3 Contains Dialogue



Little Bozu and Kon Kon is a performance in a traditional theatre setting. Audience members will be seated on floor mats and chairs.

The show includes puppetry, some background music and some audience interaction. One character speaks some simple Japanese phrases that are interpreted by another character.

At the end of the show, the audience are invited to get a closer look of the set and try to find ten hidden animals on the set. Audience members are not allowed to touch the set directly.

Massive Maker Space

Climbing Tree

Let your imagination run wild! Get creative with SA's own Climbing Tree and their huge pile of junk loose parts. Massive Maker Space is a small world of possibilities when you can make anything you can imagine!

Venue: Festival Plaza, Adelaide Festival Centre

Doors & Entry: Entry: Access Festival Plaza from King William Road, from Station Road, or from the Railway Station (exit the Railway Station via the Adelaide Festival Centre exit, turn left and travel up the escalators).

Venue Type: Outdoors - please ensure students dress for the weather

Seating: Participants will stand or be seated on the ground during the workshop. Seating can be provided if required.

Toilets: Located in the Festival Theatre foyer.

Key Details:

Event Type: Workshop Dates: 7 – 16 May 2025 Duration: 75 mins Ages: All / Years: All



Massive Maker Space is an unstructured making workshop. At the beginning of the session, facilitators will sit participants down and run through some basic rules, but after this, participants can move around the space as they like, using and touching anything in the space to make structures, and engage in imaginative play.

Participants can leave the workshop space at any time and rejoin when they are ready. This workshop takes place outdoors, so we encourage schools to promote dressing for the weather to students and their families.

Mini SPIN

Anna Seymour and Collaborators

Hosted by three Deaf hosts and a DJ, this interactive dance event celebrates connection, joy, and the power of dance rituals. In a playful interrogation of who belongs in dance rave spaces, Mini SPIN honours the intersectionality of Deaf culture, dance, and music. No dance experience required, and Deaf/HoH/CODA and hearing children are welcome. Dance raves are for everyone!

Mini SPIN is a work for D/deaf, hard of hearing, CODA and hearing children and their teachers or families.

Mini SPIN is an interactive dance performance, where the audience are encouraged to follow the instructions of the facilitators and dance along.

The performance is non-verbal. There is no spoken text or instructions, except for an audience introduction which is signed in Auslan, and interpreted into spoken English. This gives the audience an overview of what to expect. Audience members are also invited to learn some Mini SPIN related Auslan signs.

Mini SPIN is a fully standing, moving experience; however, it is accessible for wheelchair users, people with physical disabilities and people with visual impairments or low vision. The Deaf Hosts will adapt as necessary, and audiences can go at their own pace. People are welcome to leave the performance, and re-enter.

Mini SPIN can be highly physical and fast-paced, but audiences can choose the pace or the level of interaction that feels comfortable for them. Please note there may be flickering lights, and the bass can be quite heavy and the music quite loud - this is because the Deaf performers rely on feeling vibrations from the bass. DreamBIG can provide ear plugs if required.
