FORFWORD

Across the world millions of people have been protesting the desperate situation in Gaza, with eighty percent of its population of 2.3 million people displaced from their homes and the territory hovering on the brink of disaster with tens of thousands of people killed - the majority women and children - and famine an everyday reality. Unlike many humanitarian tragedies, the population is trapped in a fishbowl, unable to leave, unable to seek shelter nor safety and under the watch of global media.

Ukraine is also in our headlines with twelve million people now displaced, five of those into neighbouring countries. Not so publicly reported are the situations of the other 100 million displaced people worldwide - 35 million of whom are refugees.

In Sudan seven million people have been displaced by military action, in Syria six and a half million have sought refuge, and closer to home Rohingva refugees extend beyond one million. This is not to mention Afghanistan, so recently impacted, and a swath of African countries.

In 2023-2024 Australia will resettle some 20,000 refugees and in exchange they will make significant contributions to our country's future economy, culture and social life. In this exhibition by students across South Australia from reception to tertiary studies, in both the public and private systems, we see their responses to the themes of multiculturalism, human rights, cultural diversity, anti-racism and the welcoming of refugees into Australia, as well as how refugees become part of, and contribute towards, the Australian family.

In these posters we can see the complete journey undertaken by refugee people as they escape war and conflict in their homelands, to their flight towards refugee camps, their perilous travel by sea, their welcome, sometimes detention, and finally settling and becoming residents in a new land. We see also the goodwill and encouragement offered to new arrivals, and the myriad of issues with which they must deal before they are able to find some peace in their re-established lives. Students stress a willingness to work in unison with refugees and to look at what unites us rather than what separates us, all the while emphasising the benefits of diversity. A strong desire for peace and an harmonious world strikes at the very heart of the causes that force people to begin their refugee migration.

The organisers would like to thank all those people who have been responsible for, and who have assisted in, bringing this exhibition to fruition, and chief amongst those are the many students from over fifty schools who have given of their time and invested their creative energies in producing the wonderful works on the walls. We are always grateful for the support of the teachers and lecturers who have encouraged the artists, the community members of the Australian Migrant Resource Centre who have visited schools to relate the reality of refugees' lives and, of course, the AMRC staff, and especially Keith Preston, who provide organisational support.

Most notably we would like to acknowledge all the support we continue to receive from the South Australian Ministers for Education and Multicultural Affairs, from the state and federal governments more generally, and from the Adelaide Festival Centre.

We hope you find this exhibition enlightening and that it reinforces the faith that you have in young people to create a positive and compassionate society. We also hope that the discussion of the issues in the posters bring us all closer to a more sane, less hateful place for us all to live in peace.

THE AUSTRALIAN MIGRANT RESOURCE CENTRE

The Migrant Resource Centre of South Australia was established in 1978 by the federal government as part of a national network to assist the settlement of new arrivals to Australia and to support their cultural life. In 2015 the Migrant Resource Centre of South Australia became the Australian Migrant Resource Centre, and since its founding has supported over 150.000 humanitarian entrants from across the world - from Africa, the Middle-East, the Americas and the South East Asian regions - to become part of the Australian community.

As part of its activities the AMRC convenes a committee to coordinate a program of events around Refugee Week, centered upon United Nations World Refugee Day, honouring people who have been forced to flee their homelands. Refugee Week has become a forum for diverse community groups, government bodies and support organisations to highlight the issues refugee peoples face worldwide, and to celebrate Australia's new and establishing communities and the positive contributions they have made, and continue to make, to our cultural, social and economic development.

This youth travelling exhibition is a key component of those events.

For fourteen years the AMRC has asked schools and tertiary educational institutions to engage young people to contribute to an exhibition centered around refugees and their reception and settlement in Australia. Each year hundreds of students participate and from their entries an exhibition of approximately eighty works is created. After its initial showing at the Children's Artspace it will tour for a year to both metropolitan and regional galleries.


